Words of Inspiration

The Literal Week

Like the Sabbath, the week originated at creation, and it has been preserved and brought down to us through Bible history. God Himself measured off the first week as a sample for successive weeks to the close of time. Like every other, it consisted of seven literal days. Six days were employed in the work of creation; upon the seventh, God rested, and He then blessed this day and set it apart as a day of rest for man.

In the law given from Sinai, God recognized the week, and the facts upon which it is based. After giving the command, "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy," and specifying what shall be done on the six days, and what shall not be done on the seventh, He states the reason for thus observing the week, by pointing back to His own example: "For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day: wherefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day, and hallowed it." Exodus 20:8-11. This reason appears beautiful and forcible when we understand the days of creation to be literal. The first six days of each week are given to man for labor, because God employed the same period of the first week in the work of creation. On the seventh day man is to refrain from labor, in commemoration of the Creator's rest.

But the assumption that the events of the first week required thousands upon thousands of years, strikes directly at the foundation of the fourth commandment. It represents the Creator as commanding men to observe the week of literal days in commemoration of vast, indefinite periods. This is unlike His method of dealing with His creatures. It makes indefinite and obscure that which He has made very plain. It is infidelity in its most insidious and hence most dangerous form; its real character is so disguised that it is held and taught by many who profess to believe the Bible.

"By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth." "For He spake, and it was done; He commanded, and it stood fast." Psalm 33:6, 9. The Bible recognizes no

long ages in which the earth was slowly evolved from chaos. Of each successive day of creation, the sacred record declares that it consisted of the evening and the morning, like all other days that have followed. At the close of each day is given the result of the Creator's work. The statement is made at the close of the first week's record, "These are the generations of the heavens and of the earth when they were created." Genesis 2:4. But this does not convey the idea that the days of creation were other than literal days. Each day was called a generation, because that in it God generated, or produced, some new portion of His work.

Geologists claim to find evidence from the earth itself that it is very much older than the Mosaic record teaches. Bones of men and animals, as well as instruments of warfare, petrified trees, et cetera, much larger than any that now exist, or that have existed for thousands of years, have been discovered, and from this it is inferred that the earth was populated long before the time brought to view in the record of creation, and by a race of beings vastly superior in size to any men now living. Such reasoning has led many professed Bible believers to adopt the position that the days of creation were vast, indefinite periods.

But apart from Bible history, geology can prove nothing. Those who reason so confidently upon its discoveries have no adequate conception of the size of men, animals, and trees before the Flood, or of the great changes which then took place. Relics found in the earth do give evidence of conditions differing in many respects from the present, but the time when these conditions existed can be learned only from the Inspired Record. In the history of the Flood, inspiration has explained that which geology alone could never fathom. In the days of Noah, men, animals, and trees, many times larger than now exist, were buried, and thus preserved as an evidence to later generations that the antediluvians perished by a flood. God designed that the discovery of these things should establish faith in

inspired history; but men, with their vain reasoning, fall into the same error as did the people before the Flood-the things which God gave them as a benefit, they turn into a curse by making a wrong use of them.

It is one of Satan's devices to lead the people to accept the fables of infidelity; for he can thus obscure the law of God, in itself very plain, and embolden men to rebel against the divine government. His efforts are especially directed against the fourth commandment, because it so clearly points to the living God, the Maker of the heavens and the earth.

There is a constant effort made to explain the work of creation as the result of natural causes; and human reasoning is accepted even by professed Christians, in opposition to plain Scripture facts. There are many who oppose the investigation of the prophecies, especially those of Daniel and the Revelation, declaring them to be so obscure that we cannot understand them; yet these very persons eagerly receive the suppositions of geologists, in contradiction of the Mosaic record. But if that which God has revealed is so difficult to understand, how inconsistent it is to accept mere suppositions in regard to that which He has not revealed!

"The secret things belong unto the Lord our God: but those things which are revealed belong unto us and to our children forever." Deuteronomy 29:29. Just how God accomplished the work of creation He has never revealed to men; human science cannot search out the secrets of the Most High. His creative power is as incomprehensible as His existence.

God has permitted a flood of light to be poured upon the world in both science and art; but when professedly scientific men treat upon these subjects from a merely human point of view, they will assuredly come to wrong conclusions. It may be innocent to speculate beyond what God's word has revealed, if our theories do not contradict facts found in the Scriptures; but those who leave the word of God, and seek to account for His created works upon scientific principles, are drifting without chart or compass upon an unknown ocean. The greatest minds, if not guided by the word of God in their research, become bewildered in their attempts to trace the relations of science and revelation. Because the Creator and His works are so far beyond their comprehension that they are unable to explain them by natural laws, they regard Bible history as unreliable. Those who doubt the reliability of the records of the Old and New Testaments, will be led to go a step further,

and doubt the existence of God; and then, having lost their anchor, they are left to beat about upon the rocks of infidelity.

These persons have lost the simplicity of faith. There should be a settled belief in the divine authority of God's Holy Word. The Bible is not to be tested by men's ideas of science. Human knowledge is an unreliable guide. Skeptics who read the Bible for the sake of caviling, may, through an imperfect comprehension of either science or revelation, claim to find contradictions between them; but rightly understood, they are in perfect harmony. Moses wrote under the guidance of the Spirit of God, and a correct theory of geology will never claim discoveries that cannot be reconciled with his statements. All truth, whether in nature or in revelation, is consistent with itself in all its manifestations.

In the word of God many queries are raised that the most profound scholars can never answer. Attention is called to these subjects to show us how much there is, even among the common things of everyday life, that finite minds, with all their boasted wisdom, can never fully understand.

Yet men of science think that they can comprehend the wisdom of God, that which He has done or can do. The idea largely prevails that He is restricted by His own laws. Men either deny or ignore His existence, or think to explain everything, even the operation of His Spirit upon the human heart; and they no longer reverence His name or fear His power. They do not believe in the supernatural, not understanding God's laws or His infinite power to work His will through them. As commonly used, the term "laws of nature" comprises what men have been able to discover with regard to the laws that govern the physical world; but how limited is their knowledge, and how vast the field in which the Creator can work in harmony with His own laws and yet wholly beyond the comprehension of finite beings!

Many teach that matter possesses vital power--that certain properties are imparted to matter, and it is then left to act through its own inherent energy; and that the operations of nature are conducted in harmony with fixed laws, with which God Himself cannot interfere. This is false science, and is not sustained by the word of God. Nature is the servant of her Creator. God does not annul His laws or work contrary to them, but He is continually using them as His instruments. Nature testifies of an intelligence, a presence, an active energy, that works in and through her laws. There is in nature the continual

working of the Father and the Son. Christ says, "My Father worketh hitherto, and I work." John 5:17.

The Levites, in their hymn recorded by Nehemiah, sang, "Thou, even Thou, art Lord alone; Thou hast made heaven, the heaven of heavens, with all their host, the earth, and all things therein, . . . and Thou preservest them all." Nehemiah 9:6. As regards this world, God's work of creation is completed. For "the works were finished from the foundation of the world." Hebrews 4:3. But His energy is still exerted in upholding the objects of His creation. It is not because the mechanism that has once been set in motion continues to act by its own inherent energy that the pulse beats and breath follows breath; but every breath, every pulsation of the heart, is an evidence of the all-pervading care of Him in whom "we live, and move, and have our being." Acts 17:28. It is not because of inherent power that year by year the earth produces her bounties and continues her motion around the sun. The hand of God guides the planets and keeps them in position in their orderly march through the heavens. He "bringeth out their host by number: He calleth them all by names by the greatness of His might, for that He is strong in power; not one faileth." Isaiah 40:26. It is through His power that vegetation flourishes, that the leaves appear and the flowers bloom. He "maketh grass to grow upon the mountains" (Psalm 147:8), and by Him the valleys are made fruitful. "All the beasts of the forest . . . seek their meat from God," and every living creature, from the smallest insect up to man, is daily dependent upon His providential care. In the beautiful words of the psalmist, "These wait all upon Thee. . . . That Thou givest them they gather: Thou openest Thine hand, they are filled with good." Psalm 104:20, 21, 27, 28. His word controls the elements; He covers the heavens with clouds and prepares rain for the earth. "He giveth snow like wool: He scattereth the

hoarfrost like ashes." Psalm 147:16. "When He uttereth His voice, there is a multitude of waters in the heavens, and He causeth the vapors to ascend from the ends of the earth; He maketh lightnings with rain, and bringeth forth the wind out of His treasuries." Jeremiah 10:13.



Says the sacred writer: "Canst thou by searching find out God? canst thou find out the Almighty unto perfection? It is as high as heaven; what canst thou do? deeper than hell; what canst thou know? The measure thereof is longer than the earth, and broader than the sea." Job 11:7-9. The mightiest intellects of earth cannot comprehend God. Men may be ever searching, ever learning, and still there is an infinity beyond.

Yet the works of creation testify of God's power and greatness. "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament showeth His handiwork." Psalm 19:1. Those who take the written word as their counselor will find in science an aid to understand God. "The invisible things of Him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead." Romans 1:20.

Her Health

This month I want to concentrate on women's unique health concerns. Often, women put their needs last—I am putting your needs first! I want to remind you that by taking care of yourself, you essentially help everyone in your life. You will be healthier, happier, and have even more love and energy to give to those around you!

If you have ever watched an episode of *Little House* on the *Prairie*. and thought that would have been a swell time to live, you may want to thank God that you are alive in this century! Historically, life was particularly difficult for women. Aside from the numerous dangers and illnesses, women often became wives and mothers when they were just emerging from their own childhood.

In the past, childbirth itself was risky and not infrequently led to the death of the mother. Most women did not live long enough to be concerned about menopause or old age! In 1900, a woman's average life span was about 50 years. Now, in this new millennium, average life expectancy for American women is 82 years of age and is continuing to rise.

At Hope for Health, we are dedicated to educating you and to providing the best possible supplements so that you will not only have a long life, but also a healthy life! Nutritionists have found that women need at least these 7 nutrients daily: vitamin D3, calcium, magnesium, zinc, iron, folate, and vitamin B-12. If you are uncertain whether your diet is providing these necessary nutrients, please call Hope for Health and we will be happy to help you out!

One of the dominating health factors for women from their teens to their fifties is menstruation and menopausal issues. While a number of factors can help minimize these symptoms, no factor is more important than what you eat. Changes in your diet can decrease the amount of free-flowing estrogen in your body—the culprit behind all those unpleasant changes you experience a week to two before your period.

Consuming the right kinds of food can minimize hormonal fluctuations, while eating the wrong kinds of food can throw your body's hormonal balance out of whack. At Hope for Health we do recommend a vegan diet (no meat or dairy) not only to limit PMS symptoms, but for the benefit of your overall health.



If you want to make your PMS symptoms more tolerable, try avoiding these foods:

- Meat Red meat contains high levels of saturated fat, which can increase estrogen levels. Some meat also contains added hormones, which can enter your bloodstream and mess with your hormone levels.
- 2. Dairy—Although calcium improves PMS symptoms, dairy products will make them worse. Like red meat, dairy contains high levels of saturated fat. Hope for Health offers Coral Calcium as an excellent source of calcium. Green leafy veggies are also an excellent source of calcium.
- 3. Sugar Sugar causes blood-sugar levels to rise dramatically, increasing the likelihood of mood swings and worsening fatigue, headaches and the ability to focus. Highly refined sugars can also deplete the body of its natural stores of essential vitamins and minerals such as magnesium, zinc, and the B vitamins, which the body needs to function properly. Limiting your sugar intake throughout the month, and cutting back during the two weeks before your period can keep PMS in check.
- 4. Salt If bloating is a common PMS symptom for you, avoid salt, as it will cause you to retain water. Watch your diet carefully to avoid excess sodium intake.
- 5. Caffeine Mood swings and stress will make you want to reach for sugary foods, many of which are high in caffeine. Although chocolate may be your go-to comfort food during this week, caffeine will actually worsen your PMS symptoms, negatively affecting your mood and increasing breast tenderness.

Another important thing to remember, women, is just how critical the right amount of sleep is to maintaining optimum health. While the amount of sleep is crucial, the quality of sleep is equally important. For women, menstruation, pregnancy, and menopause can all dramatically influence the quality of sleep. Melatonin is produced during sleep. This hormone prevents viral infections, stimulates your immune system, increases antibodies in your saliva, has antioxidant properties, and enhances the quality of sleep. Much of the body's healing occurs during the nighttime hours. It is very important that you get plenty of rest at night (especially between 9pm-midnight).

Never forget how important you are to the Lord, He loves you! "Favor is deceitful, and beauty is vain; but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised. Give her of the fruit of her hands; and let her own works praise her in the gates."

Damiana & Sexual Function

Damiana has long been claimed to have a stimulating effect on libido, and its use as an aphrodisiac has continued into modern times, with recent scientific research validating this use. Several studies have shown evidence of increased sexual activity in both sexes. It has been shown to increase the sperm count and help with erectile dysfunction in males and strengthen the eggs and help with the inability to achieve orgasm in females. 

These effects have been verified by scientific research, and it has recently been shown that a chemical essential to the plant's structure, damianin, causes a calming of the central nervous system which may cause some of its relaxation effects.

Words of Wisdom

Creation and Redemption

by E. J. Waggoner

"In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." (Gen. 1:1) In this brief sentence we have the whole of the truth of the Gospel summed up. He who reads aright may derive a world of comfort from it.

In the first place, let us consider who it was that created the heaven and the earth. "God created." But Christ is God, the brightness of the Father's glory, and the express image of His person (Heb. 1:3). He Himself said, "I and My Father are one." (John 10:30) He it was who, representing the Father, created the heaven and the earth. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made." (John 1:1-3) And again we read of Christ, that "by Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers: all things were created by Him and for Him: and He is before all things, and by Him all things consist." (Col. 1:17)

The Father Himself addresses the Son as God and as Creator. The first chapter of Hebrews says that God has not at any time said to any of the angels, "Thou art My Son, this day have I begotten Thee." "But unto the Son He saith, Thy throne, O God, is for ever and ever: a sceptre of righteousness is the sceptre of Thy kingdom." And He has also said to the Son, "Thou, Lord, in the beginning hast laid the foundation of the earth, and the heavens are the works of Thine hands." (Heb. 1:5,8,10) So we are well assured that when we read in the first chapter of Genesis, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth," it refers to God in Christ.

Creative power is the distinguishing mark of Divinity. The Spirit of the Lord, through the prophet Jeremiah, describes the vanity of idols, and then continues, "But the Lord is the true God, He is the living God, and an everlasting King: at His wrath the earth shall tremble, and the nations shall not be able to abide His indignation. Thus shall ye say unto them, The gods that have not made the heavens and the earth, even they shall perish from the earth, and from under

these heavens. He hath made the earth by His power, He hath established the world by His wisdom, and hath stretched out the heavens by His discretion." (Jer. 10:10-12) The earth was made by His power, and established by His Wisdom. But Christ is "the power of God, and the wisdom of God." So here again we find Christ inseparably connected with creation as the Creator. Only as we acknowledge and worship Christ as the Creator do we acknowledge His Divinity.

Christ is Redeemer by virtue of His power as Creator. We read that "we have redemption through His blood, even the forgiveness of sins," because that "by Him were all things created." (Col. 1:14,16) If He were not Creator, He could not be Redeemer.

This means simply that redemptive power and creative power are the same. To redeem is to create. This is shown in the statement of the apostle that the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation; which statement is immediately followed by another to the effect that the power of God is seen by means of the things that have been made (Rom 1:16,20). When we consider the works of creation, and think of the power manifested in them, we are contemplating the power of redemption.

There has been a great deal of idle speculation as to which is the greater, redemption or creation. Many have thought that redemption is a greater work than creation. Such speculation is idle, because only infinite power could

perform either work, and infinite power cannot be measured by human minds. But while we cannot measure the power, we can easily settle the question of which is the greater, because the Scriptures give us the information. Neither is greater than the other, for both are the same. Redemption is creation. Redemption is the same power that was put forth in the beginning to create the world and all that is in it, now put forth to save men and the earth from the curse of sin.

The Scriptures are very clear on this point. The Psalmist prayed, "Create in me a clean heart, and renew a right spirit within me." (Ps. 51:10) The apostle says, that "if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature," (2 Cor. 5:17) or a new creation. And again we read, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained, that we should walk in them." (Eph. 2:8-10)

Compared with God, man is "less than nothing, and vanity." (Isa. 40:17) In him "dwelleth no good thing." (Rom. 7:18) Now the same power that in the beginning made the earth from nothing, takes man, if he is willing, and makes of him that which is "to the praise of the glory of His grace." (Eph. 1:6)

Having seen that Christ, the Word, is the Creator of all things, and that He redeems by His creative power, let us now

learn what the Bible says as to how He created. Here is the answer: "By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth. He gathereth the waters of the sea together as an heap: He layeth up the depth in storehouses. Let all the earth fear the Lord: let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of Him. For He spake, and it was; He commanded, and it stood fast." (Ps. 33:6-9) It is very simple, and most wonderful because of its very simplicity. Well may we all exclaim, "What a word is this!"

"Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear." (Heb. 11:3) How do we know how the worlds were made? By faith. Faith gives knowledge. That is its special work. Knowledge gained by faith is not vague and uncertain, but is the most absolutely certain of any knowledge. In fact, there is no real knowledge that does not spring from faith. Knowledge that comes in any other way is speculation. The unbelieving soul regards faith as folly, but the faithful soul knows that faith makes for it a solid foundation. Whoever will believe may know. ...

Now, just as the child learns the alphabet, so we learn the truths of God. Whoever receives the kingdom of heaven must receive it as a little child. By faith we learn to know Jesus Christ, who is the Alpha and the Omega—the entire alphabet of God. He who believes the simple statement of the Bible, concerning creation, may know for a certainty that God did create the heaven and the earth by the power of His Word. The fact that some unbeliever doubts this, and thinks it is foolish, does not shake his knowledge, nor prove that he does not know it, any more than our knowledge of the alphabet is shaken or disproved by some other person's ignorance of it.

"By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth." ... When He speaks, the word which names the thing contains the very thing itself. Whatever the word describes exists in living form in that word.

This is indicated by the words of the Apostle Paul concerning God, that He "calleth those things which be not as though they were." This is an attribute of Divinity

alone. If a man calls a thing that is not, as though it were, it is a lie. But God does so, and He cannot lie. How is this? Simply because that when He calls a thing by name, or says that a thing will be, it already exists, even though it cannot be seen. The thing is in His word. When He names a thing that previously had no existence, that instant the thing exists, for His word forms it as it names it. When He says that a thing will be, then it is as sure as though it had already appeared, because it does really exist in the word that has been spoken. It is for this reason that so much of prophecy is in the perfect tense, as though already accomplished. So when the worlds were to be brought into existence, God spoke, and there they were. They were formed by the breath of His mouth.

Now see how firm a foundation is given the believing one who knows that all things were created by the word of God, and that when God speaks the thing named exists, full of life. The Psalmist says, "I will hear what God the Lord will speak: for He will speak peace unto His people, and to His saints." (Ps. 85:8) He speaks peace through the Divine Word, "for He is our peace." (Eph. 2:14) But peace means righteousness, for we read, "Great peace have they which love Thy law: and nothing shall offend them," (Ps. 119:165) or cause them to stumble. And again, "O that thou hadst hearkened to My commandments! then had thy peace been as a river, and thy righteousness as the waves of the sea." (Isa. 48:18) Then it must be that God speaks righteousness when He speaks peace. And so it is, for again we read:

"But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested, being witnessed by the law and the prophets; even the righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe: for there is no difference: for all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; being justified (made righteous, or doers of the law) freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus: whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation through faith in His blood, to declare His righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God; to declare, I say, at this time His righteousness: that He might be just, and the Justifier of Him which believeth in Jesus." (Rom. 3:21-26)

Notice that man is declared to have no righteousness: "There is none that doeth good, no, not one." (Rom. 3:12) No one has anything in him out of which righteousness can be made. Then the righteousness of God is put, literally, into and upon all that believe. Then they are both clothed with righteousness, and filled with it, according to the Scripture. In fact, they then become "the righteousness of God" in Christ. And how is this accomplished? God declares His righteousness upon the one who believes. To declare is to speak. So God speaks to the sinner, who is nothing, and who has nothing, and says, "You are righteous," and immediately that believing sinner ceases to be a sinner, and is the righteousness of God. The word of God which speaks righteousness has the righteousness itself in it, and as soon as the sinner believes, and receives that word into his own heart by faith, that moment he has the righteousness of God in his heart; and since out of the heart are the issues of life, it follows that a new life is thus begun in him; and that life is a life of obedience to

the commandments of God. Thus faith is indeed the substance of things hoped for; because faith appropriates the word of God, and the word of God is substance.

The same word that created the earth also upholds it. We quote again the words concerning Christ: "For in Him were all things created, in the heavens and upon the earth, things visible and things invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers; all things have been created through Him, and unto Him; and He is before all things, and in Him all things consist." (Col. 1:16,17, R.V.) To consist means to hold together. Therefore all things on the earth, and the earth itself, owe their continued existence to Christ. So Paul declared on Mars' Hill, "In Him we live, and move, and have our being." (Acts 17:28).

3. What do the heavens declare?

"The heavens declare *the glory of God*; and the firmament showeth His handiwork." Ps. 19:1.

4. What was God's object in making the earth?

"For thus saith the Lord that created the heavens; God Himself that formed the earth and made it; He hath established it, He created it not in vain, *He formed it to be inhabited.*" Isa. 45:18.

5. In whose image was man created?

"So God created man *in His own image*, in the image of God created He him; male and female created He them." Gen. 1:27.

6. What home did God make for man in the beginning?

"And the Lord God *planted a garden* eastward in Eden; and there He put the man whom He had formed. And out of the ground made the Lord God to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight, and good for food. . . . And the Lord God took the man, and put him into *the garden of Eden* to dress it and to keep it." Gen. 2:8-15.

7. What may be perceived through the things that are made?

"For *the invisible things of Him* from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even *His eternal power and Godhead*; so that they are without excuse." Rom. 1:20.

"For we are *His workmanship*, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." Eph. 2:10.

9. What assurance is given concerning the unfailing power of the Creator?

"Hast thou not known? hast thou not heard, that the everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth, *fainteth not*, *neither is weary*? there is no searching of His understanding." Isa. 40:28.

10. What encouraging statement follows concerning the supply of power to the faint?

"He giveth power to the faint; and to them that have no might He increaseth strength." Verse 29.

11. To whom are those who suffer exhorted to commit their souls?

"Wherefore let them also that suffer according to the will of God commit their souls in well-doing *unto a faithful Creator.*" 1 Peter 4: 19, R. V.

12. What gave special force to the oath of an angel?

"And the angel which I saw stand upon the sea and upon the earth lifted up his hand to heaven, and sware by Him that liveth forever and ever, who created heaven, and the things that therein are, and the earth, and the things that therein are, and the sea, and the things which are therein, that there should be time no longer." Rev. 10:5,6.

13. What contrast is drawn in the Scriptures between the Creator and false gods?

"Thus shall ye say unto them, *The gods that have not made the heavens and the earth*, even they shall perish from the earth, and from under these heavens. . . . The portion of Jacob is not like them: for *He is the former of all things*; and Israel is the rod of His inheritance: The Lord of hosts is His name." Jer. 10:11-16.

14. To whom is our worship justly due?

"O come, let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before *the Lord our Maker.*" Ps. 95:6.

15. In view of the curse upon this creation, what has God promised?

"For, behold, *I create new heavens and a new earth*: and the former shall not be remembered, nor come into mind."

Isa, 65:17. See Rev. 21:1.

16. What is the true basis of the brotherhood of man?

"Have we not all one Father? hath not one God created us? why do we deal treacherously every man against his brother, by profaning the covenant of our fathers?" Mal. 2:10.



The Bombardier Beetle

The whole process had to be designed and put in place all at once and not over a succession of generations.

The Miracle of Childbirth

No candid person can study the amazing process of pro-creation without being overwhelmed by the divine design involved. From conception to delivery, the processes that take place defy the concept of evolution. Here is just one example of the handiwork of God, without which there could be no viable birth.

Right at birth a miraculous change must take place in the baby's circulatory system. Throughout the pregnancy, the placenta has been supplying the functions of the liver, the lungs, the kidneys, and carrying away waste and carbon dioxide while supplying the oxygen and necessary nutrition. In other words, the placenta has been the life support system for the baby. Now that is about to come to an end, and because it will end, there must be a rearranging of the baby's circulatory system.

Up until now the blood has been by-passing the liver and the lungs, detouring around these major organs, while the placenta was temporarily performing their functions. These detours are called shunts. Another way of looking at this is to think of the path of least resistance. The resistance into the liver and lungs has been high, therefore restricting the flow through them. The blood was flowing freely through the shunts



and to and from the placenta, because the resistance was quite low. At birth, the blood is able to continue straight through the liver and the lungs where the resistance has now fallen, due to the amniotic fluid being displaced and the blood vessels expanding.

Another marvel of creation is the restriction of blood flow in the umbilical cord. A strong muscle-like tissue that surrounds the cord begins contracting, clamping down on it. There is an amazing substance called Wharton's Jelly that has been serving a very important role while the baby was in the womb. This jelly-like material has helped prevent the cord from kinking and pinching off the blood flow, so necessary for the baby's survival. Now this jelly serves a different and opposite purpose. After being exposed to the cold air, it begins to condense and harden. The result is a restriction of the blood flow to and from the baby. This prevents excessive blood loss for both the baby and the mother.

When the cord gets clamped and severed, the blood flow is completely channeled back into the arteries. Gradually, the shunts, or bypasses, begin to shrink and disappear. Now all the plumbing is re-organized so that the baby's organs can do all that the placenta was doing. All this takes place in a matter of minutes.

As you can see, this is just not possible with evolution. Charles Darwin admitted in his book, *On the Origin of Species*, "If it could be demonstrated that any complex organ existed, which could not possibly have been formed by numerous, successive, slight modifications, my theory would absolutely break down. But I can find out no such case." Darwin, living in the mid 1800's, obviously knew nothing of this miracle of childbirth. Here his theory does indeed "absolutely break down," not just once or twice, but countless times. One little glitch in this process and there is no baby and no second chance to get it right!

Big Bang or Bust?

"The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God." Psalm 14:1. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and instruction." The world today, especially the scientific world, is a breeding ground for fools, for those who enter the sciences are taught that there is no God. Fortunately, there are a growing number in the realm of science who are willing to fight against the current and maintain a faith in the Creator. Words of the Pioneers

Creation or Evolution: Which?

By the Scriptures we have found that God is Creator; that all His works are accomplished by creation; and that creation is "immediate," "sudden," "now." And we have found that Christianity is creation; that Christian experience is an experience of creation.

Yet in spite of the fact that the Word of God says explicitly and only that the world with all that is of it was created, and that this creation was accomplished by six separate and distinct creative words, in six days; and in spite of the fact that one of the three chief originators of modern evolution says plainly that "evolution is antagonistic to creation," there are many professed believers of the Bible and professed Christians who hold that the world and all that is of it came by evolution; that is, by an almost interminably long and slow-moving series of ages.

Now, why is this?—It is simply because these persons have not faith. For it is written, "Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear." (Heb. 11:3.) Creation—the fact of creation—is understood by faith. Then when any one does not understand it, but instead adopts that which is "antagonistic to creation," it is certain that such a person has not faith. And since faith cometh by hearing the word of God (Rom. 10:17), by which alone creation is accomplished, then when any one does not understand creation, but accepts instead that which is "antagonistic to creation," it is plain that this is simply because he does not accept the word of God as the word of God, but looks upon it only as the word of men having in it no more power to create than has the word of man. And looking upon the word of God only as the word of men, having in it no possibility of creation, then in the very nature of the case all that can remain is that he accept the notion that all things could have come only of themselves, and of course only through an interminably long succession of ages, and thus only by evolution.

Therefore, this whole matter as between evolution and creation turns upon the one single question: Is the word of God really the word of God?

Is then the word of God really the word of God, or is it only as the word of men? And this question simply means, Is God really God, or is He no more than a man would be in His place; so that His word means no more than a man's word would mean spoken on the same subject?

That the word of God is really the word of God, can be known by every soul. And this can be known simply by faith; that is, simply by accepting it as the word of God, expecting that word itself to do what the word says. (Matt. 8:8, 10.) And so it is written, "For this cause also thank we God without ceasing, because, when ye received the word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." 1 Thess. 2:13.

When the word of God is received as the word of God that it is, and not as the word of men; that is, when it is received by faith, then it is found to be the word of God that it is in truth. And when it is found to be the word of God in truth, it is found and known to be the creative word that it is in truth, accomplishing itself the thing which the word says. And so, again, it is written: "As the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven and watereth the earth and maketh it bring forth and bud that it may give seed to the sower and bread to the eater; so shall My word be that goeth forth out of My mouth; it shall not return unto Me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." Isa. 55:9-11.

It is not we who accomplish what the word of God says; but "it shall accomplish" in us what the word says. And thus "it is God that worketh in you that which is well pleasing in His sight." Therefore "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly." Thus Christianity is creation.

And this is just what every professed Christian needs to learn; that Christianity is creation, not evolution; that Christian experience at the beginning and always is by creation, not by evolution; that it is "immediate," "sudden," "now," and not a long, tedious struggle, and even then still unaccomplished.

Every soul who has had the glorious experience of the divine forgiveness and conversion, knows full well that it was accomplished immediately, suddenly, "now." And that is creation; for we are His workmanship created in Christ Jesus; and the clean heart is the result of creation—"Create in me a clean heart, O God." And this beginning of Christian experience, being, as everyone knows, "immediate," "sudden," "now," is evidence enough that Christian experience at every stage is accomplished in the same way—by creation. Is it not even so written that "now is the accepted time, now is the day of salvation?" That is simply the assurance to every soul of the divine—the Christian—experience of the creative word and power that accomplishes things "now."

For it must not be forgotten that though from the beginning to the finishing of the creation of the world there were six days and six successive stages, yet each of these was a distinct creation by the word of God spoken specifically to the accomplishment of that particular stage toward the completed creation. At each stage, God "said" the creative word, "and it was so."

And that is written to make plain to all the people forever that, since Christian experience is by creation equally with the formation of the world, and equally by the same Person speaking the word, however many steps or

stages there may be from the beginning to the finishing in perfection of Christian experience, yet each successive step or stage in that experience is a distinct creation by the word of God, spoken by the Holy Spirit to the mind and heart and spirit of the believer specifically to the accomplishment of that particular stage.

Therefore, the life of faith, which is life by creation and not by evolution, is to read the word of God constantly, receiving it as the word of God in truth, expecting it to accomplish the thing that it says. And when by the light of the word and the Spirit there is seen any lack in the life, find the word of God that speaks the thing that will supply the need, then thank God in the Spirit for that word, accept it in the Spirit as the word of God to you, expect it to accomplish that which it says, depend upon the word itself to accomplish this in supply of your need creatively, that is "immediately," "suddenly," "now," and in the Spirit of God and in the faith of the word of God thank God that "it is so;" that the thing is done, and that the victory is yours. And thus "this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith;" faith in God through Christ by the Spirit as Creator; faith in His word as the creative word; faith in His doing things by His word creatively, which is "immediately," "suddenly," "now."

Now, dear soul, are you a creationist, or are you an evolutionist? And if you see that you have been an evolutionist, will you not drop it "immediately," "suddenly," just "now" by faith in the Creator and the creative word, and henceforth be a true creationist only?

The Eye of the Trilobite

According to the Darwinists (those who believe in Charles Darwin's evolutionary theory), the first life forms were very simple. From these simple beginnings, succeeding generations would usher in the more complex forms as life would better adapt to its surroundings. The various rock strata are dated supposedly by the complexity of the life forms found as fossils in the different strata. The Cambrian strata is supposed to be one of the oldest and has been dated around 600 million years old or more.

What scientists have discovered, however, is a very perplexing problem for the evolutionists. Tiny little creatures called trilobites have often left their fossils imbedded in these strata. Once thought to be a very simple marine life form, researchers have discovered that they possessed an extremely complex eye. Here is how one expert describes it:

"An eye that is simply incredible. It is made up of dozens of little tubes which are all at slightly different angles so that it covers the entire field of vision, with a different tube pointing at each spot on the horizon. But these tubes are all more complicated than that, by far. They have a lens on them that is optically arranged in a very complicated way, and it is bound into another layer that has to be just exactly right for them to see anything.

. . But the more complicated that it is, the less likely it is simply to have grown up out of nothing."

Not only is this discovery of the complex eye a dilemma for the evolutionist, but the fact that there is absolutely no evidence of anything leading up to it is more remarkable. This life form just suddenly appears at the beginning of the fossil record. Given the fact that Charles Darwin himself was mystified by the complexity of the human eye, one can only imagine how he might have reacted to this discovery, had it been made in his lifetime.

The Cambrian Explosion

The Cambrian level reveals some remarkable facts, including the discovery that every phylum is represented in that strata. Literally thousands of species of plant and animal life are to be found at the Cambrian level, but absolutely nothing in the preceding level, known as the Pre-Cambrian. All these life forms just suddenly appear with nothing leading up to them. This sudden explosion of life has never been adequately explained by the evolutionist.

Another nail in the coffin of evolution is that there is absolutely no trace of transitional forms to be found in the Cambrian strata. If life evolved, surely there would be ample evidence of transitions from one life form to another in all that profusion of life, but there is no trace to be found. Not only has there not been a transitional form found in the Cambrian strata, but in no other strata either. Scientists are still looking for what they call "the missing link," but in reality, there should be multiplied millions of links present in the fossil record if evolution was true. The fact that none have been found should be enough to convince every evolutionist that their theory is hopeless.

Information in DNA

Evolution requires a continuous gain of new information in the DNA of all living things. The amount of information in a DNA chain is staggering and only testifies to an infinitely wise Creator. Darwin's concept of the simplest life forms evolving into more complex forms flies right into the face of modern research into genetics. Where does the information come from that would allow something simple to reproduce something more complex?

This is no problem for creationists, however. The Bible tells us that God created all living things (in a single week) with the ability to recreate after their own kinds. All the information was present in every kind that would allow for the diversity we see. In other words, the first dogs had within their DNA the information necessary to bring about the wide variety of canines we see today. In addition, the ability to adapt to various environments was also included in the original information God placed within the DNA.

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
